

Derek Woods (1927 - 2020)

It is with great regret that I write to inform you of the death of Derek Woods.

Derek joined the Elisabeth Curtis Centre in the early 2000s, looking for company and a distraction from his grief at the recent loss of a much loved partner. He became a volunteer with the Wednesday afternoon session, with riders from the former Rainbow School.

Derek could lead a pony but preferred side helping with all the riders. He had a particular affinity for one rider who was mute, but always had a lovely smile for Derek.

Derek enjoyed the camaraderie of the Wednesday helpers and thoroughly enjoyed social events such as the Christmas dinner. When he decided to move to Suffolk, he was greatly missed by the Wednesday team.

But working as a volunteer was only part of Derek's involvement with ECC. He began making financial donations when he realised what an amazing place the Centre is, and how expensive it is to run. When he moved away he began sending annual donations which gradually got bigger and bigger. Eventually his contribution reached almost six figures. We were very happy to make him an Honorary Life President and he was delighted with this title.

He was our most generous supporter to date, possibly for ever?

I kept in touch with Derek from the time he moved to Suffolk,

sending "Thank You" letters. birthday cards, small gifts and cards at Christmas. Derek would phone me regularly to say thank you and ask about the Centre. I continued to be in contact with him even after I left the Centre myself. It was the lack of a call after Christmas that alerted me to the fact that something was amiss.

In the Autumn of 2019 Derek became ill and was hospitalised. He was never well enough again to return to his own home and moved into a care home. He died there in April 2020, just three months short of his 94th birthday.

Thank you, Derek. Your support of the Elisabeth Curtis Centre has been outstanding.

Pony welfare update...



When writing for our last newsletter, I was looking forward to the return of our riders, and I hadn't imagined that all these months later, we would still be waiting to welcome our riders back! Although life at the Elisabeth Curtis Centre has been very different since we closed in March 2020, the care and management of the ponies continues.

Despite the ponies not having their normal work routine, they still require daily care and routine treatments. The farrier has continued his 6 weekly visits, and the vet has regularly attended for routine vaccinations and dental treatments. In September, the saddler and osteopath visited the Centre. Ponies tend to change shape throughout the year, and the saddler usually visits twice a year to check that the saddles correctly fit each pony. This involves the saddler making adjustments to the saddles, or in some cases, changing the saddle a pony uses. The osteopath treated all the ponies, and advised on individual exercises for each pony, to support their treatments. Our ponies have also been enjoying, and benefiting from equine sports massage treatments, kindly provided by Alice Mills. In January, the ponies had their annual health check, in which the vet checks each pony's heart, lungs, eyes, weight, soundness and general condition.

Due to COVID 19, a great deal of time and effort was put into the introduction of infection control measures at the Centre. We then needed to familiarise the ponies to these measures. This included introducing the ponies to people wearing face masks

and shields, and to the scent of hand sanitiser, and the products used for sanitising the tack and stable equipment.

Following six months of not being ridden, the ponies resumed ridden exercise in September. We rely on several volunteers to exercise our ponies. The focus was on getting the ponies fit, ready for reopening the Centre. The ponies enjoyed being ridden again and by December they were all looking fit and ready for the Centre to reopen, and then we went into tier four, at which point we had to suspend ridden exercise. The ponies were finally able to resume ridden exercise in late March, and we are currently working on their fitness in preparation for the return of our participants. Thank you as always, to our dedicated volunteers who support us in exercising and training the ponies.

The early part of this year brought some very challenging weather. We had so much rain, and some snow, the fields became extremely wet and muddy. We decided to temporarily stable the ponies overnight to give them some respite and protect the grazing. Our grooms, Kristina and Anna, worked hard to accommodate the changes in the ponies' routines. Following nearly 3 weeks of being stabled overnight, the ponies returned to living out again.

Our new pony, Bobby, was officially signed over to the Centre at the end of October. Introducing a new pony to the herd can take time as the ponies adjust to changes in the herd dynamics. Bobby has settled in well and enjoys being part of the herd. Bobby has made good progress, and we look forward to introducing him to our participants.

With restrictions easing, we have finally been able to welcome

back some of our volunteers for training sessions. These sessions have been much enjoyed by all, including the ponies! I am really looking forward to seeing the return of our participants, and seeing our ponies return to the wonderful work that they do.


